



On the Nigerian flag below, the green symbolizes agriculture and the lush forests of Nigeria. The white stripe represents peace and unity. Is this flag truly representing this country at this time? Why or why not?









"We were able to extract every Nigerian kidnapping in the database over the past quarter-century - 25,247 in all. GDELT's, the Global Database of Events, Language and Tone, data shows that the number of kidnappings over the past three decades has risen from just two in 1983 to 3,608 in 2013. It's an increase so large that it's probably not solely the result of better reporting or the rise in (and online availability of) news reports on the topic. There have been 2,285 kidnappings in Nigeria in the first four months of 2014, suggesting that the problem is worsening. The recent mass abduction of schoolgirls took place April 15; the database records 151 kidnappings on that day and 215 the next."
